



A TROPICAL RELATIVE OF THE APPLE. (*CRATAEGUS STIPULOSA* (H. B. K.) STEUD., S. P. I. No. 43430.)

The manzanilla grows wild in the highlands of Guatemala. Several closely allied species are common in Mexico. The fruits are as large as crab apples, deep yellow flushed with red, and attractive in appearance. In preserved form they are popular. They merit cultivation in other regions where conditions are subtropical and not favorable to the apples of the temperate zone.
