



THE CAPUCHIN ORANGE OF CHILE. (CITRUS SINENSIS (L.) OSBECK, S. P. I. No. 54651.)

This orange, presumably a horticultural variety of the common sweet orange, differs from the latter in its dwarf habit of growth and the small size of its fruits, which are rarely over 2 inches in diameter. Since the flavor and quality of the fruit are excellent, the variety suggests itself as of interest for cultivation in California and Florida, where it may prove useful as an attractive dooryard tree.
