



FLOWERS, LEAVES, AND FRUIT OF THE MACADAMIA, *MACADAMIA TERNIFOLIA*.

In Queensland this nut has become of commercial importance and orchards of it are being planted. No selection of varieties has yet been made, nor is it possible as yet to predict with regard to yields or diseases, but the fact that the tree will fruit in southern Florida makes it eligible for trial by a large number of experimenters. The fruits are borne in clusters, the shell is thick, and the edible portion is as easily removed as that of a filbert. In Plant Immigrants No. 78 is shown an illustration of the nuts.
