



THE LARGE-FRUITED HAWTHORN OF GUATEMALA.

(*CRATAEGUS STIPULOSA* STEUD.)

In the markets of Guatemalan towns this Manzanilla is a common fruit. It comes from the highlands, where it is extensively used for the preparation of jams and jellies, for which purpose its deep yellow, applelike fruits are admirably suited. The flavor of these fruits resembles that of our own hawthorn, but is somewhat better. This species ought to thrive in California and Florida. See S. P. I. No. 43430.
