



**THE MANZANILLA, A CENTRAL AMERICAN FRUIT TREE. (CRATAEGUS STIPULOSA. SEE S. P. I. NO. 45575.)**

The manzanilla, a species of hawthorn, grows wild and is also cultivated in the highlands of Guatemala. The fruits are prized by the Guatemalans for jellies and jams, but are also eaten stewed. Average fruits are an inch or more in diameter, yellow, with russet dots and a blushed cheek. The plant is easily grown and should succeed in California, Florida, and elsewhere in the subtropics.
