



**TAMAYO'S BLACKBERRY BUSH, NORTHERN ECUADOR.**

(*Rubus adenotrichos* Schlecht., S. P. I. No. 54279.)

This species is the largest grower of all those which have been introduced from the Andean region. It is also notable for its productivity. The fruits are in terminal clusters, sometimes 2 feet long, each cluster containing as many as several hundred berries. The latter are much like the cultivated blackberries of the North in size, color, and flavor. Since the species grows in Ecuador at elevations of 10,000 to 12,000 feet, it may prove sufficiently hardy for cultivation in the Pacific Northwest, California, and the extreme South.
