



THE GROVE OF JAPANESE BAMBOO AT THE SAVANNAH PLANT INTRODUCTION GARDEN.

(*Phyllostachys* sp.; S. P. I. No. 40851.)

This grove, which through the generosity of Barbour Lathrop, of Chicago, has come into the possession of the United States Department of Agriculture and which now covers over an acre of land and has poles in it over 55 feet high, originated from a few plants imported by Andres E. Moynelo "early in the eighties." It is spreading rapidly and stands as an example of the superbly beautiful groves of this timber bamboo which will some day change the landscapes of our Southern States and furnish a unique timber material suited for a host of purposes on the farms where it will be grown.
