No. 19400. Huey-Wang, Penninsula Thailand. December 29, 1964. Small to medium-sized tree, 5 to 8 meters high. Growing in evergreen hill forest in well drained soil. A related species, *Hydnocarpus anthelmintica*, is the source of chaulmoogra oil which has been used in Asia for decades in the treatment of skin diseases, such as leprosy.
